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Theme 4B Focus: Recycled Sculpture Trail

Theme 4B Learning Activities explore Recycled Sculpture trails through:

- Visual Art: making sculptures from organic and reclaimed materials
- Performance: creating performances around the sculpture trails
- Literacy: poetry and stories

Learning Resources & Materials

Theme 4B engages participants in developing sculpture trails in response to a sense of place, devised from a range of natural, reclaimed and recycled media.

Materials:

- Natural materials e.g. plants, stones, water, clay etc.
- Reclaimed and recycled materials e.g. card, paper, metal, plastic, packaging, wood.
- Fixing materials e.g. glue, tape, string, scissors & tools
- Cameras/phones and sketchbooks

Level 3 Learning Activity: Recycled Sculpture Trail Sculpture Trail using found and reclaimed materials

- Choose a theme for the Sculpture Trail e.g. Birds
- Collect a mixture of found and reclaimed materials
- Experiment with materials to create sculpture in the landscape.
- Create story-telling events and performances in the Sculpture Trail



Level 1: Natural & Reclaimed Sculptural Installations

- > Collect natural materials, drawings and personal objects.
- > Make a sculptural installation and invite visitors to add to it.

Level 2: Natural & Reclaimed Sculptural Installations

- > Make a sculptural installation using clay:
- > Natural objects are inspirational e.g. stones, trees, cones, shells
- > Experiment with clay to create sculptural pieces



Level 2 & 3: Natural & Reclaimed Sculptural Installations

- Children use natural and reclaimed materials to create sculptural installations inspired by the <u>Bower Bird's bower making</u>
